



#### CONSTITUTION and BY-LANS

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

This organization shall be called the BEVERLY HILLE STEREO CLDB.

#### ARFICLE II -- ALGS

The aims of this Club shall be: Promotion of clereoscopic photography through the association of its members for study and outsitairment.

#### AKTICLE III - Membership

Any person of good character, practicing stereoscopic descriping is oligible for membership according to provisions prescribed in the By-Laws.

#### ARTICLE IV - Officere

The officers shall consist of a President, a Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, whose duties and manner of electica shall be as prescribed in the By-Laws.

## ARTICLE V - Meetings

Regular meetings of the Club shall be held as preses bed in the Dy Lare. All business meetings shall be conducted in assertions with Robert's "Fulas of Order".

## ARTIC E VI - Essevelus nebe

Section 1. Any proposed change of this Constitution may be presented by cither a majority vote of the cificers or by fifteen (15) or more madebate.

Section 2. Such proposed change must be presented in writing at a business went ing of the Club. It shall then be tabled until the following regards business meeting, when it shall be voted upon. The proposed change shall require at least incothing affile artise vote of the numbers present.

#### ARTICLE VII - Adop Lon

This Constitution and secompanying By-Laws shall be considered adopted when they have been approved by fifteen (15) or name persons at an open asoting called for that purpose and who have paid the yearly those appealfied in the By-Laws.

#### BY-LAWS of the BEVERLY HILLS STEREO CLUB

## ARTICLE I - Membership

Any person of good character, practicing stereo photography, whose application has been endorsed by a member of the Club and submitted together with the prescribed initiation fee and annual dues, shall be declared a member of the Club upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members present at a business meeting. The first one hundred (100) members admitted to this Club shall be known as CHARTER WEMBERS and shall not be required to pay an initiation fee but shall be required to pay the annual dues upon application and shall nest all other requirements of membership. Any member whose dues are in arrears three (3) menths or more shall be automatically dropped from membership. Reinstatement shall require an initiation fee and one full years dues. There shall be no limitation as to the number of members of this Club.

#### ARTICLE II -- Dues and Initiation Fee

The annual dues shall be ten (\$10.00) dollars, payable in advance. The initiation fee, payable only once, shall be ten (\$10.00) dollars.

#### ARTICLE III - Election of Officers

- Section 1. The February meeting shall be designated as the Club's Amazal Business Mosting, at which officers shall be elected. During the arrand month previous to the Annual Meeting the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee to present a slate of officer numbers at the meeting preceding the Annual Meeting.
- Section 2. Such numbrations shall be received at the meeting preceding the Annual Meeting, and additional numbrations may be made from the floor.
- Section 3. All numiness shall be saked if they are willing to serve if elected, as a condition for placement of their names on the ballet-
- Section 4. At the Annual Meeting the President shall appoint Tellers, who shall distribute ballots.
- Section 5. The caadidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected, and shall take office the first day of March.

#### ARTICLE IV -- Daties of Officero

- Section 1. The President shall preside at all regular and special mediage if the Club, serve as chairmen of the Executive Council, and administration the affairs of the Club with the assistance of the Executive Council. He shall appoint all committee chairmen, and shall approve all billo before their payment and all official matter to be published. He shall endeavor to assume active leadership of the Club at all times.
- Section 2. The Vice-President shall preside at all meetings in the obsence of the President, and shall assume the duties of that exists in the error of death or resignation.
- Section 3. The Secretary shall keep a record of proceedings of all require and special rectings. He shall used out calls for operial mestings and carry on and keep a file of the correspondence of the Club. He shall maintain a complete and current list of nombership, and shall present applications for membership which come to him for acceptance of its jection. He shall fulfill any other duties not above specified but which are usually incombent upon that office.

#### ARTICLE IV - Dubles of Officers (work'd)

Section 4. The Transver shall set as unstadion for all Club funds, depositing them in one or more bushing institutions approved by the Ensemble Council. He shall send out bills for dues and acknowledge their receipt, and pay all bills authorized by the President, Resping a detailed account of all receipts and disbursements. He shall make a semi-immuel report to the Club of the condition of the Transver, and shall present the books, accounts, vouchers, and an annual statement to the Auditing Committee.

Section S. The Ersoutive Council shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and four additional members of the Club.

#### ARTICLS V -- Countries

Section 1. The Fresident shall appoint Chairman for each of the permanent conmittees. Each Chairman shall then appoint no less than two additional
members. The President also shall appoint Chairman for a Keminating
Committee and an Auditley Conmittee, and such other special committee
as may be required.

Section 2. The Mambarship Committee shall promote Club membership and, with the approval of the Executive Council, plan any membership drive that may be desirable.

Section 3. The Progrem Countities shall plan a program for each meeting, providing instruction and entertainment in line with the wiches of the mester ship as a whole.

Gretion 4. The Publicity Chairman shall publicite the sotivities and plane of the Club, slumps beging in read that this Club endervors to mointain the highest level of dignity and integraty.

#### ARRICLE VI -- Meatings

Section 1. Regular beainess sectings shall be hold monthly, on the third headay of each month.

Section 2. The Pebruary menting shall be designated as the Club's Annual Hasiness Necting for election of officers, and as the start of the Club's fiscal year.

Section 8. Special markings may be called by the President at his discretion.

### ARTICLE VII - Campus of Office

The officers and Emecutive Council chall sorve from March let ontil and including the last day of February is the following year. The succeeding officers and Executive Council shall be newinated and elected at the February business meeting and shall serve, officiate, and determine policy of the Cive without compensation or remuneration of any kind.





We are promised our new screen and a new REALIST PROJECTOR for this occasion which should really set off the award winners beautifully.



We hope that this new type of polarization becomes the standard form for it is a real improvement.


# MEREDITH OFFERS CLASSES

## VETS NEED HELP

# HAD "PINK EYE" LATELY?

One doesn't have to be an oculist to treat this malady which has become so prevalent in stereo photography. While "pink eye" has long been present in color photography, it was never too pronounced nor objectionable until modern stereo photographers started to use flash units mounted on top of their cameras. The cause is easy to understand and just a little thought and effort will cure it.

'Pink eye", as we choose to call it, is caused by the light from the flash entering the eye of the subject, bouncing back from the inside of the eye to the camera lens, and being caught in this triangle from flash to eye to lens. This is a disastrous situation for the photographer who is covering a wedding, or when shooting any person. The entire shot is hopelessly lost when this occurs. This can happen only when the iris of the eye is dilated, such as occurs when the natural lighting of the area is of such low intensity that the pupils of the eyes dilate to admit more light. It is obvious then that the cure for "pink eye" can be accomplished by having sufficient extra light in the room. This will cause the pupils to contract and capture the light that enters the eye, but will not let it bounce back out

If this extra light situation is not possible, then there are two other alternatives: One can use a flash that is set off to the side of the camera, or one must not shoot directly into the subject's face. In other words the subject

# The \*FOURTH DIMENSION

All of us who own stereo cameras are more-than-averagely conscious of all three of the dimensions of height, width and-especially-depth. According to Albert Einstein there is still another dimension: the fourth dimension of "time". I'll have to admit it's reaching a little to take a theory of Einstein's, ignore the theory part completely (just grab the title) and then apply my own personal meaning to fit this title. Anyway, for what it's worth, here's my own conception of the fourth dimension as applied to stereo photography. It involves starting out with a goodly portion of the three dimensions as supplied by the Realist stereo camera, adding a generous helping of the fourth dimension (meaning a more than average amount of "time" spent in taking your stereos), and then resulting—with luck—in some extra-wonderful THREE DIMENSION photos.

As examples of the type of persons who do not usually bother with the fourth dimension in stereo are the fellows and gals who are always going on trips to wonderful places and coming back loaded down with all kinds of sensational stereos. This gives them a reputation as being terrific photographers when actually - you know, come to think of it, these extra-exciting photos most of them return with ARE pretty sensational. I guess these photowanderers deserve full credit for bringing the highlights of their journeys back for our vicarious pleasure. DARN IT! I'm jealous; why don't I ever get to go anywhere?



# 3-DIMENSION-ALITY



HAROLD LLOYD

It is not at all surprising that Harold Lloyd should be named "Mr. Stereo" by the many people who are familiar with his 3-Dimensional work. Harold has an excellent sense of things artistic which began at the age of twelve when he made his theatrical debut playing Little Abe in the famous play, "Tess of the d'Ubervilles" with the Burwood Stock Company in Omaha, Nebraska. While in high school in San Diego, California, he was an instructor in the School of Dramatic Art. He landed in Hollywood after touring with a stock company and made his first picture at Universal Studios and subsequently with Mack Sennett.

Harold's characterizations will be remembered by many as Willie Work and Lonesome Luke, and his other famous character, the typical American boy wearing horn-rimmed specs. After making numerous single reel comedies he graduated to what were known as "the \$125,000 Two-reel Harold Lloyd Comedies." His first feature length picture was "Grandma's Boy" which ignited a bomb-shell career bringing forth such pictures as "Dr. Jack", "Safety Last", "Why Worry", "Girl Shy", "The Freshman", "The

Kid Brother", "For Heaven's Sake", "Speedy", "Welcome Danger" (his first talking picture), "Feet First", "Movie Crazy", "The Cat's Paw", and "Professor Beware".

He starred in the "Milky Way" for Paramount and produced two pictures for RKO in which he did not appear himself, "A Girl, A Guy and A Gob" and "My Favorite Spy". His latest role was "Mad Wednesday" produced by Howard Hughes.

He married Mildred Davis, his leading lady in a number of pictures and the couple have three children: Mrs. William O. Guasti (Gloria), Mrs. A. Bartlett Ross (Peggy) and Harold, Jr., U.S.A.F. Their estate in Beverly Hills is called "Greenacres."

In 1950 Lloyd became Imperial Potentate of the Shrine (A.A.O.N.M.S.). His Temple is Al Malaikah, Los Angeles, which also honored him by elevating him to Potentate. His deep interest at the moment is the charitable activities of the Shrine, particularly their Hospitals for Crippled Children of which he is a Member of the Board, Los Angeles Unit.

His current hobbies are painting, microscopy, magic, chess, checkers, and his incomparable Stereo work.

# Daylight or Type A Film?

Since stereo photography has come into such prominence, there is a relentless argument as to which is preferred - Daylight or Type A Kodachrome. Realizing that a preference for anything is predicated on individual taste, we cannot absolutely solve this question. But the consensus among stereo photographers is that Type A is the more versatile film. The following will indicate why. Artificial light (Type A) film has more latitude in exposure possibilities than Daylight Type because it has a speed index of ASA 16, or Weston 12 and, at the same time, when converted for daylight use, has the same speed index of regular Daylight Type Kodachrome of ASA 10, or Weston 8, thus competing with Daylight film on even terms. On the other hand, Daylight Type Kodachrome, when used with artificial light, loses more than 50% of its speed. In other words, when Daylight fi'm is converted for use with artificial lighting, its index becomes ASA 4, or Weston 3. And when compared with Type A film speed index of ASA 16, or Weston 12, it can readily be seen that Daylight film, when used with artificial lights, is only one-fourth as fast as the Type A film. Even the novice can see here how limited Daylight Type film is under the dual lighting conditions mentioned above.

Here it should be understood that what has been said above does not preclude the use of Daylight Type Kodachrome by any means. It is designed for DAYLIGHT USE. If it is known beforehand that a roll of film will be used for DAYLIGHT SHOOTING ONLY, we recommend the use of this type film. However, if there is the slightest question about whether shooting will be done under both conditions, then by all means use Type A film, converting with filters for outdoor shooting, when necessary.

# STEREOLUSIONS

Reg. Trade Mark

So you're really interested in making your own special effects in Stereo? Wonderful! Before going any further, then, I'd like to propose a little experiment for you to try—sort of a "negative approach" to this idea of experimental stereo work. You should find it interesting, and I KNOW that you'll find it a great money saver for those times when you want to try out some of these ideas of mine—or your own. By using 35mm BLACK AND

By using 35mm BLACK AND WHITE FILM in your camera you can make test exposures at a cost of about three cents per photo, instead of the twenty-two cents that it would cost if Kodachrome were used. A negative stereo is rather a strange thing to become familiar with, so it's a good idea to start out by shooting a complete roll of 29 exposures on any and all types of subjects, and then mounting and viewing them stereowise.



Here's the procedure for this first experimental trial: Buy a 29-Stereo-Exposure roll of RELOAD 35mm Black and White film (69c). Load it into your Stereo-REALIST in the regular manner, set for the proper exposure for a sunshiny day (ask Roy what 'tis when you buy the film from him), then go out into the world and shoot up the entire roll. Photograph anything and everything – people, things, close-ups, distant shots, etc. When you're all through, take the exposed film back to Roy and have him develop the negatives (25c). When the film comes back you can either have it mounted for you (which, frankly, costs too much when it isn't Kodachrome) or you can break down and invest in a David White stereo Film-Cutter, a sorting tray, and also

## TILT!

A Stereo camera, unlike any other kind, cannot be tilted when taking a picture. Since the base of both pictures have to match, the camera will have to be level for every picture. Nothing is quite so hard on the eyes as to have to look at a picture where the bottom of the frames do not match. If you are having such trouble why not place your camera on a tripod and with the aid of a small spirit level check to see if the camera is level. The photographer who is thoroughly familiar with the Stereo camera will seldom find the spirit level really necessary . . . he will line up the bottom of the picture carefully through the viewfinder and make sure that the bottom frameline is level. Like a slot machine . . . IT DOESN'T PAY OFF IF YOU TILT.

some stereo mounts — and do the mounting yourself. I suggest using the new (and wonderful) EMDE Aluminum Mounts — so that later you can remove the negative test-films from the mounts (they easily slip in and out) and use the same mounts over again for your Kodachromes. IMPORTANT: Be sure that the negative film is mounted so that the shiny side is toward your eyes when you view it. This keeps it from being backwards when you look at it (it's bad enough just having the "colors" backwards).


There you have it. Put the negative slides in your viewer and figure them out. GET USED TO THEM. At least give it a try so that you'll see for yourself the possibilities of this system for making stereo tests inexpensively. And by the way—these negatives can be used to make *ordinary* black and white prints, in case you come up with something beyond just a test.

That's it for now—next month we'll get back to the actual "Illusions." Have fun.

## Remember When

By this time it was about 11:00 p.m. and the print had to be made, fixed, washed, dried, mounted, and spotted. WOW! Besides the work the amount of fatigue accumulated was really something and all this just to show an 11 x 14 print for a few minutes and in black and white too. Was it worth all the trouble and time spent?

The answer seems to be in the ever increasing popularity of STEREO. How different it is to be able to select any shot that has already been taken, check the categories and select the proper slide for submitting. All the labor and drudgery of the darkroom has been eliminated leaving nothing but the enjoyment of photography with REALISM and COLOR. 



How much of John was exposed to the president will probably never be known, for John was working feverishly behind his realist.

Meredith's recent trip to Washington was an assignment by the David White Company, to cover the inauguration. John says that the only way the inauguration could have been more impressive would have been for it to be performed backwards, but then this would have given him pseudostereo shots.

Speaking of "Stereo", and what else do you speak of, there are now and soon to be more Stereo motion pictures than you can throw your glasses at. The kick-off to this new era came with "Bwana Devil", which has been followed by the English Tri-Optican Stereo movie, and a new Canadian cartoon, "Around is Around Is a Film".

The need for a new camera technique and projection technique is most apparent when viewing these films, for there are two distinct drawbacks which hurt the viewers' eyes. The wide interocular camera positions make the background images nearly a foot apart on the screen, which has a S-T-R-E-T-C-H

effect on the eyes.

The projection system is sadly in need of improvement, and we notice the lack of synchronization in the two films in double projection. When these films slip of sync, two or three frames, there is a blur in all action that is tremendously disturbing. It would seem that both projectors could be locked by governor-type motors, thereby avoiding this fault. At the same time, cameras should be mounted closer together in order that in the taking they could be adjusted on the bar for closeups of about 50 millimeters apart and on the medium to normal parts about 70 millimeters. It is a growing baby, and in its growth many errors will be made and corrected until Stereo motion picture is as perfect a technique as we now know the present planar movie. In the meantime, it would be a let more comforting to realize the present problems and forgive them, and help this new industry to grow. Roy



# STEREOLUSIONS

This month let's experiment with HYPER-STEREO — the technique of taking third-dimensional photographs where the effective interocular distance (between the two lenses of your camera) is greater than normal.

Special effects in stereo are the result of knowing many of the different "peculiarities" especially applicable to 3D photography. It's my aim to boil down details that could be very technical and give them to you in small, sugar-coated, easy-to-take doses. Each column is devoted to just one idea—presented so that it can be put to use immediately with the least possible effort. Stereo photography is a hobby with most of us, so let's skip the work and have the fun.

HYPER-STEREO gives exaggerated stereo at the expense of "miniaturizing" the subject. It's main use—as far as we're concerned right now—will be to give depth to so - called backdrop-type scenics. Flat scenes of faraway subjects will become third dimensional beyond anything that your eyes have ever seen directly.



Let's use the above photo as our sample. The entire photo is a mono reproduction of a regular REAL-IST stereo. Except for the fisherman in the foreground (deliberately put there is order to give the flat background depth by comparison) most of the scene is anywhere from a few hundred feet to over a mile away (the rock formations on the hill).

Now let's imagine that there was no foreground of sufficient interest to be included — something that happens all too often. This is represented by the smaller portion of the photo that is within the white-line border. You've moved forward to

the edge of the water so that the view-finder sees only this portion now. If you went ahead and just took a "regular" stereo you'd have absolutely no third-dimension at all.

So we'll use HYPER-STEREO.

First study the entire scene through the view-finder so that you can always "return" to it. Keep the camera level and locate a few reference points along the bottom and one edge of the scene. IT'S VERY IMPORTANT THAT YOU BE ABLE TO LINE THE CAMERA UP VERY EXACTLY EACH TIME THAT YOU LOOK THRU THE VIEW-FINDER.

Now get ready to take three photos one after the other—exactly the same except that in between each photo you move sideways (camera and all of course) approximately six inches. Don't worry about the exact distance, but DO WORRY ABOUT VIEW-FINDING THE SCENE EXACTLY THE SAME EACH TIME.

Your only other concern is that the scene you have chosen is one where there will be no movement of anything during the time the three photos are taken. No visably moving water, no wind blowing the trees, no people moving about (have them pose perfectly still during the three shots), et cetera. There is a technical reason why this is important, but it's enough for you just to know that it's important in later viewing of the slide(s) that this "rule" be strictly adhered to—so, NO MOVEMENT!

You'll have to do your own slide-mounting in order to carry this idea to its logical conclusion, so if you're not doing so already, you're going to be forced into discovering how much fun and how really easy it is with Joe Simpson's new aluminum EMDE masks. You'll want a few of the NORMAL type masks for this.

Take the three "exactly similar" sets of stereos of this one scene six individual frames in all. Either cut them from the roll of film yourself with REALIST film cutter or remove thme from their masks if they're already mounted. Mix 'em up. The EMDE mounts are made so that the film can be inserted and removed easily and repeatedly, so start experimenting. Pick out any two of the six pieces of film and put them in a mask (remember, glossy side up always). If things look completely haywire when you look at the slide in a viewer, the

pieces of film have been mounted "backwards" so remove them from the mask and reverse them left for right. Study what you see. Then mount another two films in another mask. Then the final two. STUDY THEM. You'll be surprised! You'll see third dimension that really is third dimension. Now, just to investigate all the possibilities, remove the just-mounted pieces of film from the EMDE masks, scramble them up once more, and remount them all over again. Keep doing this until you get the one combination out of all the possibilities that's the very best according to your own tastes.

NOTE: For this example—where the scene included objects from several hundred feet away minimum to a mile away maximum—I recommended moving six inches sideways between successive photos. For objects that are really distant (such as when you're on a cliff or the edge of a canyon miles from the nearest object) move several feet each time.

There you have it: a brief introduction to one type of stereo control that can come in very handy at times. So, the next time you're out where the scenery is far away and flat (but definitely worth photographing) try HYPER-STEREO and come back with something extra special.

It's really worth the "trouble". TRY IT! Jommy Thomas



# STEREOLUSIONS

One of the most continually useful items in the realm of trick photography is the black background. In the Number Two (November-1952) issue of this column, I went into detail regarding a method of making "Twins" through double exposure . . . using a black background. Let's carry that idea on a little bit.

By the way, for those of you who wish a relatively inexpensive black background that you can use indoors (as you may remember, I previously suggested making photographs involving double exposures at night for a "natural" black background), I now suggest that you might wish to have an old wool blanket dyed black at your neighborhood cleaners. A G. I. blanket is perfect.

Many of you saw the Shipstads & Johnson ICE FOLLIES when it was in town several months ago, so you will recognize the picture of the charming Scotvold Twins, Joyce and Joanne. Only now, through a simple double-exposure, they appear as "Quadruplets".



Using the above photo as a guide, let us imagine that we wish to make just one person into a set of quadruplets. Furthermore, through the use of "colored lighting", we want to have each image differently colored: One in natural color and then successively a solid blue, red, and yellow, let us say.

All of this will have to be done in front of a black background, naturally, so start by hanging it up if it is cloth or going outdoor at night (Brr-r-rr) if it is not. The "Doorway" consists of a single board that is propped up into a vertical position as shown. Because of

the four-fold exposure, it is suggested that you use a dark-colored wood this time . . . perhaps the leaf from your dining room table will work.

Let's go through the exact proceedure once without the colored light effect . . . more or less just as shown in the accompanying

photo of the Scotvolds.

Have the board propped up vertically on the right side and your model posed peeking out near the top. Your camera is mounted on a tripod and located an appropriate distance away. Using flash (or any other type of lighting, of course) take the first exposure. Re-cock the shutter and put in a new flashbulb. Do not advance the film until all four exposures have been made. Have your model slide down to the lower position on the right, and take the second exposure. Re-cock the shutter, new flashbulb. Now rearrange your board so that it is on the left side of your scene and re-peat the proceedure just described to take the third and fourth exposures . . . all on the same film. That's all there is to it. You

should be able to end up with a stereo picture very similar to the one here. Because you will be using one person instead of twins, though, there may be a slight bit of overlapping of the figures . . . but certainly not enough to be

bothersome.

Now let's do the same thing all over again, but this time with the colored-images idea. Start out by taking the first exposure of the model (upper right-hand corner, say) in the "regular" full-color fashion . . . just as you did before. Now, for the second exposure, scotch-tape a double layer of BLUE cellophane completely across the front of your flash reflector. Open up the diaphragms of your camera lenses THREE full stops to make up for the light loss caused by the blue cellophane. Take your second exposure. Continue on to the third exposure set-up. This time use two layers of RED cellophane, but only open up the lenses TWO stops from normal this time (red is less opaque than blue). Then finally take the fourth exposure using two layers of YELLOW cellophane, and this time only opening up your lenses ONE stop.

Your results should be quite intriguing, to say the least.

Think about it a moment and you'll see that the variations that you can perform with this idea of the colored cellophane in front of your flashbulbs are almost endless.



# STEREOLUSIONS

Before going into a discussion on "Back-lighting with Sunshine," I would like to take this opportunity to introduce the young lady silhouetted below. Many of you are already acquainted with Snoka Thorardson . . . in person, through my stereos of her shown on the screen during Club slide showings, or—indirectly more directly — through watching her win awards for her own prize-winning stereos entered in recent Club contests.

Snoka (pronounced Sno-ka), a long-time very good friend, is also my business partner in the making and merchandising of our "Stereolusion" slides . . . through our firm, Dimensional Enterprises. It was mainly through her initial interest and enthusiasm in the idea that "Stereolusions" were put on the market. She makes a wonderful partner in business and—as is more than just a little obvious—she is a wonderful model when it comes to the actual making of these special slides

Snoka would be among the first, though, to have to admit that a model's life is not an easy one—especially a model for "Stereolusions." She helps carry equipment (no minor task sometimes), assists in setting it up, poses endlessly (sometimes for many minutes at a time without being "permitted" to move a muscle, sometimes on and off for hours on end), and, well... it goes on and on. I wanted to take this occasion to point out that many of the suggestions put forth in this column have come to you in simplified, ready-to-use form mainly because of their already having been tried out "the hard way" on Snoka.

As a performer Bob Hope is constant demand. To many he syn

inal—was taken in the early evening after the sun had just disappeared behind the mountains. Let's examine the possibilities for this same stereo under different conditions of outdor lighting.

Taken in the "ordinary" way the sun would have been behind the photographer and shining fully upon Snoka, posed in profile (1/50th at f/6.3).

Let's suppose that the sun is behind the *model* this time. Now's our chance to take a really spectacular stereo. By a combination of waiting for the sun to sink low enough and shifting the camera and/or arranging the position of the model, line up the sun so that it is exactly behind the model's head. Done correctly, with the sun completely hidden by the head, you can produce a truly marvelous photo . . . with a *Halo Effect* in and around the hair that makes for a wonderful "Natural Stereolusion" with backlighting that will rival some of the best of John Meredith's professional studio effects (I say this accompanied with a low bow. John). You have two methods of exposure here: "Straight" by making up for the lack of actual sunshine on the camera side of the model by opening up your camera lenses to f/4 at 1/50th, or with Flash Fill-In by using a GE #5-B flashbulb (I assume you'll be using Daylight Kodachrome or its filtered equivalent) at a distance of eight feet or so (f/9 at 1/25th). Try both of these exposure methods . . . they produce almost completely different effects, both beautiful.

Finally wait for the sun to completely disappear (but just barely) to duplicate the illustrated silhouette photo of Snoka. By this time the light will be fairly weak so—if you don't own an exposure meter—you'll have to take a chance on just what exposure is best. I used f/5.6 at 1/10th here . . determined by temporarily ignoring Snoka (which was difficult) and aiming my Weston meter directly at where the sun had disappeared behind the mountains. Nothing to it, but you should see it in stereo.

You know, half the fun of finishing up the personal slides I make is in finding a really appropriate title. This one was easy . . . in fact I titled it automatically the first time I saw it on film: "WOW!"

Well, have fun now ... I do.



# "STEREOLUSIONS"

For those of you who would like to make your own "illusions in stereo," here's an easy type to start cut with—the making of one person into twins.



The "secret" of the whole stunt is to use a black background. Black velvet cloth is the very best and most convenient, of course, but you can get around this by taking the photo outdoors at night. Flash lighting fades out quickly into blackness as the distance behind the subject increases, so just pick out a spot where there is nothing in the background for the first fifty feet or so-and use that as your black background. The end result of either method is to supply something as a backdrop for your subject that will not register on the film during the taking of the multiple photographs; therefore you can "re-expose" almost endlessly on a single sheet of film until all of the space is used up—being careful not to overlap images, naturally.

For this photo I had the young lady in front of a black velvet drop and my camera on a tripod. I lined her up as she appears at the right —up close and sort of peeking in. The camera was focused, the lens opening set to correspond with the setting for an SM flashbulb at that distance, and the first part of the photo taken. Then, as the girl moved backwards and over to my left a little for the second photo, the shutter was re-cocked but the film was not advanced. Then I lined up my model as she appears at the left—posing prettily further back. Again the camera was focused, the lens opening set to correspond with the setting for another SM flashbulb at that rew distance, and the

second part of the photo was taken. Then the film was advanced. That's all there was to it. The variations are endless.



Before proceeding further I would like to point out that a great deal of time and money can be saved when experimenting with these special effects if you use ordinary black and white film in your camera for the initial tests.

As you can see, a negative print is rather a strange thing to become familiar with—especially in stereo—so it's a good idea to shoot up your first roll on various "regular" subjects just for the experience. Important: When mounting black and white film be sure that the film is mounted so that the shiny side is toward your eyes when viewing. This keeps it from being backwards when you look at it (it's bad enough just having the "colors" backwards).

Be sure to give this idea a try so that you'll see for yourself the



possibilities of this system for making stereo tests inexpensively. By the way: ask your dealer for "reloaded" 35 mm. film . . . it's half the cost and just as good here.



Now let's experiment with Hyper-Stereo—the technique of taking third-dimensional photographs where the effective inter-ocular distance (between the two lenses of your camera) is greater than normal.

Hyper-Stereo gives exaggerated stereo at the expense of "miniaturizing" the subject. Its main use—as far as we're concerned right now—will be to give depth to so-called backdrop-type scenics. Flat scenes of faraway subjects will become third dimensional beyond anything that your eyes have ever seen directly.

Let's use this scenic photo as our example. The entire photo is a mono reproduction of a regular REALIST stereo. Except for the fisherman in the foreground (deliberately put there in order to give the flat backdrop depth by comparison) most of the scene is anywhere from a few hundred feet to over a mile away (the rock formations on the hill).

Now let's imagine that there was no foreground of sufficient interest to be included — something that happens all too often. This is represented by the smaller portion of the photo that is within the white-line border. You've moved forward to the edge of the water so that the view-finder sees only this portion now. If you went ahead and just took a "regular" stereo you'd have absolutely no third-dimension at all.

So we'll use Hyper-Stereo.

First study the entire scene through the view-finder so that you can always "return" to it. Keep the camera level and locate a few reference points along the bottom and one edge of the scene. It's very important that you be able to line the camera up very exactly each time that you look thru the viewfinder.

Now get ready to take three photos one after the other—exactly the same except that in between each photo you move sideways (camera and all of course) approximately six inches. Don't worry about the exact distance, but do worry about view-finding the scene exactly the same each time.

Your only other concern is that the scene you have chosen is one where there will be no movement of anything during the time the three photos are taken. No visably moving water, no wind blowing the trees, no people moving about (have them pose perfectly still during the three shots), et cetera, There is a technical reason why this is important, but it's enough for you just to know that it's important in later viewing of the slide (s) that this "rule" be strictly adhered to—so, no movement!

You'll have to do your own slide-mounting in order to carry this idea to its logical conclusion, so if you're not doing so already, you're going to be forced into discovering how much fun and how really easy it is with Joe Simpson's new aluminum EMDE masks. You'll want a few of the normal type masks for this

Take the three "exactly similar" sets of stereos of this one scenesix individual frames in all. Either cut them from the roll of film your-self with a REALIST film cutter or remove them from their masks if they're already mounted. Mix 'em up. The EMDE mounts are made so that the film can be inserted and removed easily and repeatedly, so start experimenting. Pick out any two of the six pieces of film and put them in a mask (remember, glossy side up always). If things look completely haywire when you look at the slide in a viewer, the pieces of film have been mounted "backwards" so remove them from the mask and reverse them left for right. Study what you see. Then mount another two films in another mask. Then the final two. Study them. You'll be surprised! You'll see third dimension that really is third dimension. Now, just to investigate all the possibilities, remove the just-mounted pieces of film from the EMDE masks, scramble them up once more, and remount them all over again. Keep doing this until you get the one combination out of all the possibilities that's the very best according to your own tastes.

Note: For this example—where the scene included objects from several hundred feet away minimum to a mile away maximum—I recommended moving six inches sideways between successive photos. For objects that are really distant (such as when you're on a cliff or the edge of a canyon miles from the nearest object) move several feet each time.

There you have it: a brief introduction to one type of stereo control that can come in very handy at times. So, the next time you're out where the scenery is far away and flat (but definitely worth photographing) try **Hyper-Stereo** and come back with something ex-

tra special.



Using this photo as a guide, now let us imagine that we wish to make just one person into a set of quadruplets. Furthermore, through the use of "colored lighting", we want to have each image differently colored: One in natural color and then successively a solid blue, red, and yellow, let us say.

All of this will have to be done in front of a black background, naturally, so start by hanging it up if it is cloth or going outdoors at

night if it is not.

By the way, for those of you who wish a relatively inexpensive black background that you can use indoors (as you may remember, I previously suggested making photographs involving double exposures at night for a "natural" black background), I now suggest that you might wish to have an old wool blanket dyed black at your neighborhood cleaners. A G. I. blanket is perfect.

To get back to our illustration, the "Doorway" consists of a single board that is propped up into a vertical position as shown. Because of the four-fold exposure, it is sug-

gested that you use a dark-colored wood this time . . . perhaps the leaf from your dining room table

will work.

Have the board propped up vertically on the right side and your model posed peeking out near the top. Your camera is mounted on a tripod and located an appropriate distance away. Using flash (or any other type of lighting, of course) take the first exposure. Re-cock the shutter and put in a new flashbulb. Do not advance the film until all four exposures have been made. Have your model slide down to the lower position on the right, and take the second exposure. Re-cock the shutter, new flashbulb. Now rearrange your board so that it is on the left side of your scene and repeat the procedure just described to take the third and fourth exposures . . . all on the same film. That's all there is to it. You

That's all there is to it. You should be able to end up with a stereo picture very similar to the one here. There may be a slight bit of overlapping of the figures . . . but certainly not enough to be

bothersome.

Now let's do the same thing all over again, but this time with the colored-images idea. Start out by taking the first exposure of the model (upper right-hand corner, say) in the "regular" full-color fashion . . . just as you did before. Now, for the second exposure, scotch-tape a double layer of blue cellophane completely across the front of your flash reflector. Open up the diaphragms of your camera lenses three full stops to make up for the light loss caused by the blue cellophane. Take your second exposure. Continue on to the third exposure set-up. This time use two layers of red cellophane, but only open up the lenses two stops from normal this time (red is less opaque than blue). Then finally take the fourth exposure using two layers of yellow cellophane, and this time only opening up your lenses one stop.

Your results should be quite in-

triguing, to say the least.

Think about it a moment and you'll see that the variations that you can perform with this idea of the colored cellophane in front of your flashbulbs are almost infinite.

This photo—from a stereo original—was taken in the early evening after the sun had just disappeared behind the mountains. Let's examine the possibilities for this same stereo under different conditions of outdor lighting.



But, before going into a discussion on "Back-lighting with Sunshine," I would like to take this opportunity to introduce the young lady silhouetted here. Many of you are already acquainted with Snot Thordarson . . . in person, through my stereos of her shown on the screen during Club slide showings, or—indirectly, more directly—through watching her win awards for her own prize-winning stereos entered in recent Club contests.

Snoka (pronounced Sno-kä), a long-time very good friend, is also my business partner in the making and merchandising of our "Stereolusion" slides . . . through our firm, Dimensional Enterprises. It was mainly through her initial interest and enthusiasm in the idea that "Stereolusions" were put on the market. She makes a wonderful partner in business and—as is more than just a little obvious—she is a wonderful model when it comes to the actual making of these special slides.

Snoka would be among the first, though, to have to admit that a model's life is not an easy oneespecially a model for "Stereolusions." She helps carry equipment (no minor task sometimes), assists in setting it up, poses endlessly (sometimes for many minutes at a time without being "permitted" to move a muscle, sometimes on and off for hours on end), and, well... You see what I mean. The only time Snoka gives me any "trouble" is when the surroundings are especially photogenic. Then she gets out her own Realist camera and starts taking pictures. Usually disappears completely . . . as far as getting her to help is concerned. Anyway, I wanted to point out that many of the suggestions put forth

in this column have come to you in simplified, ready-to-use form mainly because of their already having been tried out "the hard way" on Snoka.

Now to get back to our silhouette photo. Taken in the "ordinary" way the sun would have been behind the photographer and shining fully

upon Snoka, posed in profile (1/50th at f/6.3).

Let's suppose that the sun is behind the model this time. Now's our chance to take a really spectacular stereo. By a combination of waiting for the sun to sink low enough and shifting the camera and/or arranging the position of the model, line up the sun so that it is exactly behind the model's head. Done correctly, with the sun completely hidden by the head, you can produce a truly marvelous photo . . . with a Halo Effect in and around the hair that makes for a wonderful "Natural Stereolusion" with backlighting that will rival some of the best of John Meredith's professional studio effects (I say this accompanied with a low bow. John). You have two methods of exposure here: "Straight" by making up for the lack of actual sunshine on the camera side of the model by opening up your camera lenses to f/4 at 1/50th, or with Flash Fill-In by using a GE #5-B flashbulb (I assume you'll be using Daylight Kodachrome or its filtered equivalent) at a distance of ten feet or so (f/9 at 1/25th). Try both of these exposure methods . . . they produce almost completely different effects, both beautiful.

Finally wait for the sun to completely disappear (but just barely) to duplicate the illustrated silhouette photo of Snoka. By this time the light will be fairly weak so—if you don't own an exposure meter—you'll have to take a chance on just what exposure is best. I used f/5.6 at 1/10th here . . determined by temporarily ignoring Snoka (which was difficult) and aiming my Weston meter directly at where the sun had disappeared behind the mountains. Nothing to it, but you should

see it in stereo.

Well, that's all for the present . . . and I hope enough to get you started along the lines of something different in stereo. And remember: have fun . . . I do.

# BOUBLE EXPOSURES

Word has come from around the country that Isadore Arnold Berger has as much to offer in a charming personality and commentary as he does of his slides from so many countries on this globe. His approach to the securing of picture material was unique to say the least. Before setting out on his junket he took stock of his capital, camera equipment, film and wearing apparel. Berger is an honorary member of many amateur photo-graphic societies which are scattered all over the world. Making up a list of fellow members throughout the world, he then went to the airlines ticket office and purchased a record-breaking three thousand meter long ticket, (multiply this figure by three and onetwelfth and you can see how many feet of paper he had). He took two pairs of shorts, two shirts, two pairs of socks, then bought nylon underwear which he could easily launder himself. His first hop was to Hawaii and then his long journey, first stop in Japan, began. To every place he intended to visit he dispatched a telegram to one of his photographic friends to meet him at the airport. In Singapore a local dignitary came with his limousine, driven by a chauffeur, taking him to his air-conditioned house staffed with sixteen servants.

Wherever Bergern went he was the center of attraction for his casual appearance and his beard, which he allowed to grow after he left the U. S., were in complete contrast to what the people of other lands expected of a prominent American attorney.

It is interesting to note that the things which people find to fear when separated by great distances and influenced by news reports only are the very things which Isadore Berger discovered to be unreal to the people close at hand. As an example, the closer a country is to a communist border, the less the fear of the people. In Makao, the Portuguese colony which borders on China, he came close to the Chinese border and photographed vehicles bring Chinese merchandise and returning with local produce. All this was carried out in such a commonplace, matter of fact manner no one could understand why one should fear the Chinese.

"This may be a little over simplified," Berger admits, "but basically it is correct; a straight man
